## Our work revolves around five core values: Relevance, Collaboration, Respect, Adaptability, and Equity.



As a bonus to the 40 milestones contained within the timeline, these are our first conservation projects in the five East End towns on Long Island:

- 1984: *Phillips Pond Preserve*, 2.4 acres of fragile dunes in Southampton Village donated to the Trust by Burton Brous.
- 1985: *Hook Pond Preserve*, a sensitive freshwater upland in East Hampton Village.
- 1986: The Southold Town Green, an important gathering spot in the heart of Southold hamlet.
- 1995: Reel Point Preserve, a fragile coastline property on Shelter Island's Coecles Harbor donated to the Trust by the Stern family.
- 1997: Andrew Sabin Nature Preserve, an important sanctuary for fauna and flora within a highly developed corridor in Riverhead.

Bridge Gardens, Bridgehampton, a five-acre public garden open every day with free admission. Established in 2008.

**Agricultural Center at Charnews Farm**, Southold, the North Fork hub for our Farms for the Future Initiative, offering fertile soil for farmers and community gardeners. Established in 2008.


